What is Problem Based Learning?

- ✓ Places the problem at the forefront of the learning process
- ✓ Allows students to work in teams to examine the problem, identify gaps in their knowledge and set objectives for their learning
- Engage students in self-directed learning as they seek out the resources they need to gain the necessary information to develop a potential solution to the problem
- ✓ Allows teachers to act as facilitators who guide students in the learning process, rather than communicating the answers




PBL and our College Vision For Learning


- Year 9 National Assessment Program Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN)
- A minimum standard of literacy and numeracy needs to be demonstrated to be eligible to achieve the Western Australian Certificate of Education (WACE)
- This standard can be achieved two ways, through NAPLAN or OLNA
- If students achieve Band 8 or higher in their Year 9 NAPLAN reading, writing or numeracy tests they are not required to sit the corresponding components of the OLNA.
- While NAPLAN and WACE achievement are independent, research has shown that students who achieve Band 8 in Year 9 NAPLAN are working at or above the minimum standard required for the WACE.

NAPLAN Results 2018




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Growth of cohort against the Australian Mean

ONLINE LITERACY AND NUMERACY ASSESSMENT

- 6 opportunities over the next three (3) years to successfully demonstrate a minimum standard of literacy and numeracy to be eligible to achieve the Western Australian Certificate of Education (WACE).
- March and September in 2019.
- As its name indicates, the OLNA is an online test. The reading and numeracy components each comprise 45 multiple-choice questions and students have 50 minutes to complete each component. The writing component is a typed response of up to 600 words. Students have 60 minutes to complete this component.

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Students, Parents and Carers

The OLNA enables students to successfully meet the <u>Western Australian Certificate of</u> <u>Education (WACE)</u> requirement of demonstrating a minimum standard of literacy (reading and writing) and numeracy. The standard requires students to demonstrate proficiency in using a range of ACSF Level 3 skills in each component.

- After each OLNA round, the Authority provides schools with individual feedback on each student's performance. We can then use these reports to structure student learning to assist them in developing the skills they need to demonstrate the required standard.
- If students do not demonstrate the literacy and numeracy standard by the time they exit secondary school, they can apply to the Authority to re-sit the assessment at any age.

BYODD 2019 (Y7 – 11)

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Required: Surface Pro (Gen5) or better.

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Software

As part of the Newman College BYODD and CEWA Leading Lights program, *students receive their own licensed copy of Microsoft Office365 Suite* as well as the Adobe CC suite for students enrolled in Applied Information Technology subjects. These will be provided when the student receives their login account details.

Anti-Malware

The Windows 10 operating system included with the designated device comes with *Windows Defender antimalware built-in*. However some parents may wish to supplement this with additional software. Should parents wish to do this - the college recommends "FamilyZone" for parent monitoring and content filtering, and "Malwarebytes" or "Sophos" for anti-malware.

eBooks

Depending on the many subjects a student may enrol in, book listed items are tailored to the student and must be pre-ordered by the parent and an eBook levy is paid.

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RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Lessons will increase from 3 to 4 lessons per week in preparation for Years 11 and 12. (In Years 11 and 12 – students study Religion and Life every day/five lessons per week).

PRE-LITERATURE COURSE

Applications are now open. Due Friday 30 November, end of week 8.

- Applying does not guarantee acceptance into this course and applying is voluntary.
- Studying Year 10 Pre-Literature in Year 10 does not mean you must be locked in to studying Literature in Year 11 and 12. It is a great preparation course if you do wish to study Literature, but it will also prepare you to be a really strong ATAR student in Year 11 and 12 if that is what you would like to study.
- The Year 10 Literature course is a great way to extend your skills, challenge yourself and to read some truly wonderful texts.

MATHS

Only 2 Extension classes and 4 General classes in Year 10, 2019. Currently there is one Year 9 Ext 1 class and 2 Year 9 Ext 2 classes.

- This means that only the top 30 or so students from Ext 2 will be moving into Yr 10 Ext class. These students will be aiming to do the Year 11 Methods course, an ATAR course only for high achieving Maths students.
- The others will be doing Year 10 General. These General students will then be aiming to do Year 11 Apps (still an ATAR Maths course).

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ATAR: Australian Tertiary Admission Rank

ATAR Course: A course that leads to an externally set examination that is used to generate and ATAR

General Course: A course that does not lead to an externally set examination

VET: Vocational and Educational Training. Courses offered by external State Training Providers

WPL: Workplace Learning. Students attend a workplace one day a week

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Newman College Graduation

WASSA (Western Australian Statement of Student Achievement)

All students will receive a formal record of their Year 12 achievement including:

- School grades and marks
- Achievement of WACE requirements
- VET qualifications and Units of Competencies achieved

WACE (Western Australian Certificate of Education)

Awarded to students who have successfully completed and met the requirements for Senior Secondary School in WACE.

Pathways



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Choosing Pathways and Courses

Choice is based on:

- Being successful in the pathway or course
- Your interests
- Your career path
- University pre-requisites
- College pre-requisites
- The individual
- An informed decision



- For students aiming to enrol in a University Course directly from school
- External examinations in Year 12
- ATAR (Australian Tertiary Admission Rank) is calculated based on school based results and external examinations
- University offers are based on a student's ATAR
- Supported ATAR combination are 6 ATAR Courses or 5 ATAR Courses plus one General/VET Course.



- All ATAR Courses have pre-requisite grades which must be achieved to gain entry into the course
- Year 11 Course pre-requisites are based on the minimum Semester 1, Year 10 grade achieved

 The purpose of pre-requisites is to guide students into selecting courses in which they have the greatest chance of achieving success

• Pre-requisites which have not been met in Semester 1, Year 10 may be met in Semester 2, Year 10. In this situation a new subject selection meeting will take place.



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Designed for students aiming to enter further training or enter the workplace directly from school.

The pathway includes:

- General courses
- 1 VET Certificate course
- Workplace Learning.

From an Applied General Pathway, students can access:

- An apprenticeship or traineeship
- A course at a TAFE or other training provider
- A University Enabling Course
- The workforce.

Vocational Education and Training (VET)

General Pathway Students

- A variety of VET Certificate Qualification Courses are offered externally to school at TAFE and other training providers
- Students attend at their campus one day per week
- Unit equivalence for WACE
- Tailored to students' individual pathway intentions

Workplace Learning/Onsite



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• One day per week in the workplace

• Work placements are tailored to suit possible career intentions

• Unit equivalence for WACE

Application Process

These are the *current* minimum requirements for students to receive a Western Australian Certificate of Education (WACE):

Achievement Standard requirement

Achievement of at least 14 C grades or higher (or the equivalent) in Year 11 and 12 units, including at least six C grades, or equivalents, in Year 12.

Completion of at least four Year 12 ATAR courses or of a Certificate II (or higher) VET qualification.
