






Assessment Policy

Student and parent responsibilities

In-Class Assessments:

- If a student is absent from an in-class assessment due to illness, a medical certificate must be provided.
- If no medical certificate is provided or the absence is not classified as unapproved, a mark of 0% will be awarded.
- Missed Assessments- Summative (where a student can sit the assessment and receive a mark for)Students should complete the assessment in one of the two closest missed assessment sessions (i.e., if a
 student is sick for an assessment on Tuesday, the tasks must be completed on Wednesday or Friday). If
 students do not complete the task during the allocated missed assessments sessions, then a zero score will
 be recorded

Assignments:

 If a student is absent on the due date of an assignment the work should still be submitted to online, before absence or immediately on students return to school.





Teaching and Learning



Turnitin

- •An online software program that can detect similarities between an *existing work* and your *submitted* work.
- •Turnitin's database contains billions of works, such as:
 - Web Pages (blogs, organizational websites, Wikipedia)
 - Articles (scientific journals, book reviews, abstracts)
 - Other Student Papers (your own work, and the work of others).
- •After the Turnitin software has completed comparing your work to the contents of its database, a **Similarity_Report** is generated.
- •REMEMBER! Having similarities in your work **DOES NOT NECESSARILY MEAN** you have committed plagiarism! Your Teacher will review the similarities and determine their nature.



Pathways



ATAR- Direct University Pathway

The Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) is a number between 0.00 and 99.95 that indicates a student's position relative to all the students in their age group (ie all 16 to 20 year olds in WA). So, an ATAR of 80.00 means that you've achieved as well as or as better than 70% of the Year 12 school leaver age population in the state.

- Universities use the ATAR to help them select students for their courses and admission to most tertiary courses is based on the selection rank.
- Strongly recommended to take 5 ATAR courses
- The top 4 Courses are used to calculate your ATAR

General Pathway

- This path is for students who wish to enter the workforce, gain an apprenticeship or undertake further study at TAFE.
- Students who follow this path study fewer than four ATAR subjects and are typically enrolled in General and VET courses.
- Students in this pathway often study VET Certificate courses either at school or through an external provider. These VET courses include a full, nationally recognised AQF qualification and mandatory industry-related workplace learning.

Curtin UniReady



UniReady Pathway

- This is a Year 12 only pathway for students to gain entry to Curtin University through a program of study that includes a university preparation course.
- The course prepares students for university studies with a focus on the critical thinking process, research skills and university writing.
- Upon completion of the UniReady Program, students are awarded a notional ATAR of 70 which can then be used to satisfy the entry criteria for a range of degrees at Curtin University and other universities.

Pre-requisites Before being accepted for entry into the UniReady Program:

- For ATAR Pathway students: Mostly C grades in all ATAR subjects.
- For General Pathway students: Mostly B grades, and 60% or above in English Students
- provide the names of two College staff who can supply a positive recommendation attesting to their maturity and responsibility.

Costs In 2023, the total cost of participation in the Curtin UniReady Program is \$650 per student. Of this cost, the College will pay 50% (that is, \$325 per student) and the remaining \$350 is charged to families. Thus, the total cost to families is \$350.

WACE Requirements



WACE

The Western Australian Certificate of Education (WACE) is a senior certificate recognised nationally in the Australian Qualifications Framework. The WACE is awarded to students who have successfully completed two years of senior secondary schooling and have achieved the required standard. The WACE is recognised by universities, industry and other training providers.

To achieve a WACE students must:

- 1. Complete one of three course combination options:
 - 1. at least four Year 12 ATAR courses, or
 - 2. at least five Year 12 general courses and/or ATAR courses,
 - 3. complete a Certificate II or higher VET qualification in combination with ATAR, general or foundation courses.
- 2. Demonstrate the literacy and numeracy standard.
- 3. Meet the requirements for breadth and depth of study.
- 4. Meet the achievement standard.

WACE Requirements



Breadth-and-Depth Requirement

- Students must complete a minimum of 20 units in senior schooling, including:
- A minimum of ten Year 12 units, or the equivalent drawn from a limited number of VET qualifications and endorsed programs
- Four units from an English learning area course, post Year 10, including at least one pair of Year 12 units from an English learning area course
- One pair of Year 12 units from List A (arts, languages, social sciences) and
- One pair of Year 12 units from List B (mathematics, science, technology).

Achievement Standard

Students must achieve at least 14 'C' grades or equivalents in Year 11 and Year 12 units, including at least 6 'C' grades or equivalents in Year 12 units.

Literacy And Numeracy Standard

- Demonstration of the minimum standard of literacy and a minimum standard of numeracy by:
 - Achieving Band 8 or higher in reading, writing and/or numeracy components of the Year 9 NAPLAN, or
 - Successfully completing the Online Literacy and Numeracy Assessments (OLNA).

Ownership


Taking ownership of your: learning, behaviour, decisions, formation, personal development and the mark they will leave on this world.

ICT Policy




- College ICT resources may only be used for an educational purpose as instructed by College staff.
